

## **Making a Difference**

Supporting a community through collaboration and art



In 2021, StoryArk was awarded a \$13,250 Inclusive and Equitable Communities Grant to facilitate a youth creative arts initiative in the Mankato Area Public Schools, Janesville-Waldorf-Pemberton schools and Saint Peter High School. Students from diverse racial and ethnic backgrounds, socioeconomic statuses and geographic settings engaged in skills training and participated in creative arts teams to produce podcasts, short films and creative writing reflective of students' interests and life experiences. This new grant supported ten organizations as they developed initiatives which increase equity and inclusion within communities or support entrepreneurs in communities of diverse backgrounds.

### Early Childhood

- Saint Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church was awarded 612 books through an Early Literacy Grant and distributed the books through family fun nights.
- 19 early child care providers/centers received a total of \$9,650 in grants to support efforts during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 21 local Early Childhood professionals participated in free trainings provided by SMIF in 2021, impacting more than 210 children, to gain resources and knowledge to increase quality care for young children.

### **Economic Development**

- 48 Nicollet businesses received \$480,000 in DEED Small Business Relief Grants to assist with pandemic-related challenges.

- Nola Kitchen from the Nicollet area enrolled in the Prosperity Initiative Program which provides one-on-one technical assistance to minority entrepreneurs.

## Nursing Mothers, Lactating Employees, and Pregnancy Accommodations Policy

July 2023

Nicollet County supports employees and their needs during pregnancy and following childbirth.

### Pregnancy Accommodations

The County will provide the following accommodations to a pregnant employee who desires any of these accommodations, without requirement for the employee to provide a note from their doctor or any other certification of the necessity of the accommodations:

- More frequent restroom breaks or food and water breaks;
- Seating accommodations; and
- A limit of lifting no more than 20 pounds.

In addition to the accommodations listed above, a pregnant employee seeking additional or other reasonable accommodations must notify the Human Resources Department of their request for accommodation. The employee and the employer shall engage in an interactive process with respect to the employee's request for a reasonable accommodation under this policy.

The County will provide reasonable accommodations to an employee for other health conditions related to pregnancy or childbirth if requested, with the advice of the employee's licensed health care provider or certified doula, unless the accommodation would impose an undue hardship on the operation of the employer's business. Reasonable accommodation may include temporary transfer to an existing and available position that is less strenuous or less hazardous.

### Nursing/Lactation Support

Reasonable break times for expressing milk shall be provided during the 12 months following the birth of the employee's child. Employees will be compensated for time used for the purpose of expressing milk, unless they are expressing milk during a break that is not usually paid. The County will provide a clean, private, and secure space for an employee to express milk that is in close proximity to the work area, is a room other than a bathroom, is shielded from view, is free from intrusion from co-workers or the public, and includes access to an electrical outlet.

Employees shall reserve a lactation room or other space that meets the above provisions. Employees shall use appropriate County-designated and/or Countyapproved space that meets requirements for expressing milk and for the storage and maintenance of supplies. Requests for use of alternative employer space should be discussed with and approved by the Human Resources Department. Employees should contact their supervisor to discuss appropriate break time arrangements under the lactation support policy.

### Protections and Remedies

The County shall not retaliate, or take negative action, against a pregnant or lactating employee for exercising their rights for pregnancy accommodations, nursing, or lactating. Employees who believe their rights have been violated under this law can contact the Minnesota Department of Labor and Industry's Labor Standards Division for help.



## Nursing Mothers, Lactating Employees, and Pregnancy Accommodations employee notice

Minnesota's Nursing Mothers, Lactating Employees, and Pregnancy Accommodations law (Minnesota Statutes § 181.939) gives pregnant and lactating employees certain legal rights.

Pregnant employees have the right to request and receive reasonable accommodations, which may include, but are not limited to, more frequent or longer breaks, seating, limits to heavy lifting, temporary transfer to another position, temporary leave of absence or modification in work schedule or tasks. An employer cannot require an employee to take a leave or accept an accommodation.

Lactating employees have the right to reasonable paid break times to express milk at work unless they are expressing milk during a break that is not usually paid, such as a meal break. Employers should provide a clean, private and secure room that is not a bathroom near the work area that includes access to an electrical outlet for employees to express milk.

It is against the law for an employer to retaliate, or to take negative action, against a pregnant or lactating employee for exercising their rights under this law.

Employees who believe their rights have been violated under this law can contact the Minnesota Department of Labor and Industry's Labor Standards Division at <u>dli.laborstandards@state.mn.us</u> or 651-284-5075 for help. Employees also have the right to file a civil lawsuit for relief. For more information about this law, visit <u>dli.mn.gov/newparents</u>.

### I. Introduction

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin in any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. Several other federal legal authorities supplement Title VI by extending protections based on age, sex, disability, limited English proficiency, and low-income status. In addition, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 clarified Title VI enforcement by mandating that Title VI requirements apply to *all* programs and activities of federal aid recipients regardless of whether any particular program or activity involves federal funds. Taken together, these laws require recipients and subrecipients of federal funds to ensure all programs and services are delivered to the public without discrimination.

Nicollet County Public Works, as a recipient of federal financial assistance, will ensure full compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; 49 C.F.R. Part 21 (Department of Transportation Regulations for the Implementation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964); 49 C.F.R. Part 21; and related statutes and regulations. Nicollet County Public Works acknowledges it is subject to and will comply with Federal Highway Administration Title VI Assurances.

This plan explains the how Nicollet County Public Works incorporates the requirements of Title VI and related legal authorities into its operations. The plan will be used as a reference for Nicollet County Public Works and as an informational resource for the public. The plan will be updated from time to time to reflect changes in Title VI compliance operations.

## II. Legal Authorities

The Nicollet County Public Works Title VI compliance program is governed by many legal authorities, including, but not limited to, the list below.

### III. Title VI and Non-Discrimination Policy Statement

It is the policy of Nicollet County Public Works that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, or age, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination in any operation of Nicollet County Public Works as provided by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related statutes.

In addition, Executive Order No. 12898, 59 Fed. Reg. 7629 (Feb. 11, 1994) requires Nicollet County Public Works to ensure fair treatment and meaningful involvement of low income populations in all programs and activities, and Executive Order No. 13166, 65 Fed. Reg. 50121 (Aug. 11, 2000) requires agency programs to incorporate access for people with limited English proficiency.

This policy applies to all operations of Nicollet County Public Works, including its contractors and anyone who acts on behalf of Nicollet County Public Works. This policy also applies to the operations of any department or agency to which Nicollet County Public Works extends federal financial assistance. Federal financial assistance includes grants, training, use of equipment, donations of surplus property, and other assistance.

Prohibited discrimination may be intentional or unintentional. Seemingly neutral acts that have disparate impacts on individuals of a protected group and lack a substantial legitimate justification are a form of prohibited discrimination. Harassment and retaliation are also prohibited forms of discrimination.

Examples of prohibited types of discrimination based on race, color, national origin, sex, disability, or age include: denial to an individual any service, financial aid, or other benefit; distinctions in the quality, quantity, or manner in which a benefit is provided; segregation or separate treatment; restriction in the enjoyment of any advantages, privileges, or other benefits provided; and discrimination in any activities related to highway and infrastructure or facility built or repaired.

Title VI compliance is a condition of receipt of federal funds. The Title VI Coordinator is authorized to ensure compliance with this policy, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d *et seq.* and related statutes, and the requirements of 23 C.F.R. Part 200 and 49 C.F.R. Part 21.

### IV. Title VI Assurances

The U.S. DOT requires that federal financial assistance be provided on the condition that the recipient provides an assurance that its programs and activities will be conducted in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The requirement is located at 49 CFR 21.7(a). To support the implementation of this requirement, the U.S. DOT provided an assurances agreement in U.S. DOT Order 1050.2A that federal fund recipients and subrecipients must sign as a condition of receiving federal financial assistance.

The assurances agreement provides specific non-discrimination language the Nicollet County Public Works Department is required to include in bid solicitations or requests for proposal, contracts, and real estate agreements. Nicollet County is committed to ensuring the necessary language is used as prescribed in the assurances agreement.

In accordance with this requirement, the Nicollet County Public Works Department has signed the U.S. DOT Standard Title VI/Non-Discrimination Assurances. The document is included here as **Exhibit A**.

## V. Organization, Staffing, and Structure


The Human Resources Director is ultimately responsible for assuring full compliance with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related statutes and has directed that non-discrimination is required of all agency employees, contractors, and agents pursuant to 23 C.F.R. Part 200 and 49 C.F.R. Part 21.

Nicollet County Public Works has assigned the position of Human Resources Director to perform the duties of the Title VI Coordinator and ensure implementation of the agency's Title VI program.

The Title VI Coordinator is responsible for:

- Maintaining and updating the Title VI plan on the agency's behalf;
- Ensuring relevant agency staff receive necessary Title VI training;
- Ensuring prompt processing of Title VI complaints and referral to Minnesota Department of Transportation; and
- Developing Title VI information for dissemination internally and externally.

## VI. Training

Nicollet County Public Works Department will ensure that its staff understand Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and how it may apply to their work. The following options are available for providing training:

- Review of the Nicollet County Public Works Title VI Plan
- Attendance at any available Title VI trainings provided by the Minnesota Department of Transportation, U.S. Department of Transportation or its applicable operating administrations, or the U.S. Department of Justice.
- Viewing the video <u>Understanding and Abiding by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964</u> produced by the U.S. Department of Justice

Nicollet County Public Works will maintain records indicating that staff have received training on a periodic basis.

# IX. Title VI Complaint Procedures

## Scope of Title VI Complaints

No person or groups of persons shall be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any and all programs, services, or activities administered by Nicollet County Public Works, and its contractors on the grounds of **race**, **color**, **national origin**, **sex**, **age**, **disability**, **or low-income status**.

The scope of Title VI covers all internal and external activities of Nicollet County Public Works.

The following types of actions are prohibited under Title VI protections (See <u>49 C.F.R. 21.5</u>):

- Excluding individuals or groups from participation in programs or activities
- Denying program services or benefits to individuals or groups
- Providing a different service or benefit or providing them in a manner different from what is provided to others
- Denying an opportunity to participate as a member of a planning, advisory or similar body that is an integral part of the program
- Retaliation for making a complaint or otherwise participating in any manner in an investigation or proceeding related to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964

The complaint procedure below is available from the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) in <u>Spanish</u>, <u>Somali</u>, and <u>Hmong</u>.

## How to File a Formal Title VI Complaint

Any person(s) or organization(s) believing they have been discriminated against on the basis of the protected classes stated above by Nicollet County Public Works or its contractors may file a Title VI complaint.

Discrimination complaints **must be received no more than 180 days after the alleged incident** unless the time for filing is extended by the processing agency.

Complaints shall be in writing and signed and may be filed by mail, fax, in person, or e-mail. A complaint shall contain the following information:

- A written explanation of the alleged discriminatory actions;
- The complainant's contact information, including, if available: full name, postal address, phone number, and email address;
- The basis of the complaint (e.g., race, color, national origin);
- The names of specific persons and respondents (e.g., agencies/organizations) alleged to have discriminated;
- Sufficient information to understand the facts that led the complainant to believe that discrimination occurred in a program or activity that receives Federal financial assistance; and

• The date(s) of the alleged discriminatory act(s) and whether the alleged discrimination is on-going.

Complainants are encouraged to submit complaints directly to Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) via its online complaint form available here: <u>https://www.dot.state.mn.us/civilrights/nondiscrimination-complaint-form.html</u>.

Complaints can also be filed by completing and submitting Nicollet County Public Works' Title VI Complaint Form available at Exhibit B or by sending an email or letter with the necessary information to:

MnDOT has complaint forms available in <u>Spanish</u>, <u>Somali</u>, and <u>Hmong</u>. Other languages can be accommodated as needed.

If necessary, the complainant may call MnDOT at the phone number listed below and provide the allegations by telephone. MnDOT will transcribe the allegations of the complaint as provided over the telephone and send a written complaint to the complainant for correction and signature.

After submitting a complaint, the complainant will receive a correspondence informing them of the status of the complaint within ten (10) business days of Nicollet County Public Works or other agency receiving the complaint.

Complaints received by Nicollet County Public Works' Title VI Coordinator are forwarded to the MnDOT Office of Civil Rights (OCR). MnDOT OCR will forward the complaint to the FHWA Minnesota Division Office, along with a preliminary processing recommendation. The FHWA Minnesota Division Office will forward the complaint to FHWA Headquarters Office of Civil Rights (HCR).

FHWA HCR is responsible for all determinations regarding whether to accept, dismiss, or transfer Title VI complaints. There are four potential outcomes for processing complaints:

- 1. **Accept:** If a complaint is timely filed, contains sufficient information to support a claim under Title VI, and concerns matters under the FHWA's jurisdiction, then HCR will send to the complainant, the respondent agency, and the FHWA Minnesota Division Office a written notice that it has accepted the complaint for investigation.
- 2. **Preliminary Review:** If it is unclear whether the complaint allegations are sufficient to support a claim under Title VI, then HCR may (1) dismiss it or (2) engage in a preliminary review to acquire additional information from the complainant and/or respondent before deciding whether to accept, dismiss, or refer the complaint.
- 3. **Procedural Dismissal:** If a complaint is not timely filed, is not in writing and signed, or features other procedural/practical defects, then HCR will send the complainant, respondent, and FHWA Minnesota Division Office a written notice that it is dismissing the complaint.
- 4. **Referral\Dismissal:** If the complaint is procedurally sufficient but FHWA (1) lacks jurisdiction over the subject matter or (2) lacks jurisdiction over the respondent entity, then HCR will either dismiss the complaint or refer it to another agency that does have jurisdiction. If HCR dismisses the complaint, it will send the complainant, respondent, and FHWA Division Office a copy of the written dismissal notice. For referrals, FHWA will send a written referral notice with a copy of the complaint to the proper Federal agency and a copy to the USDOT Departmental Office of Civil Rights.

Complaints are not investigated by Nicollet County Public Works. FHWA HCR is responsible for investigating all complaints. FHWA HCR may also delegate the investigation to MnDOT OCR, who would then conduct all data requests, interviews, and analysis and create a Report of Investigation (ROI). MnDOT OCR will have sixty (60) business days from the date the

investigation is delegated to prepare the ROI and send it to HCR. HCR will review the ROI and compose a Letter of Finding based on the ROI.

# X. Environmental Justice

Executive Order 12898, Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations, requires federal agencies to make achieving environmental justice a part of its mission by identifying and addressing disproportionately high and adverse human health and environmental effects of their programs, policies, and activities on minority and low-income populations. The requirements are to be carried out to the greatest extent practicable and permitted by law.

In May 2012, USDOT issued an update to DOT Order 5610.2(a), DOT Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations, which was originally published in April 1997. The revised Order continues to be a key component of DOT's environmental justice strategy. It updates and clarifies certain aspects of the original Order while maintaining its general framework and procedures and DOT's commitment to promote the principles of environmental justice in all DOT programs, policies, and activities.

Similarly, Nicollet County Public Works will institutionalize the same key components of DOT's environmental justice strategy and commitment to promote the principles of environmental justice in all Nicollet County Public Works' programs, policies, and activities. These policies outline actions and factors to address environmental justice in order to identify and avoid discrimination and disproportionality high and adverse effects on minority and low-income populations:

- Identify and evaluate environmental, public health, and interrelated social and economic effects of Nicollet County Public Works' programs, policies, and activities;
- Propose measures to avoid, minimize, and/or mitigate disproportionately high and adverse environmental and public health effects and interrelated social and economic effects, and provide offsetting benefits and opportunities to enhance communities, neighborhoods, and individuals affected by Nicollet County Public Works' programs, policies, and activities, where permitted by law and consistent with Executive Order 12898;
- Consider alternatives to proposed programs, policies, and activities where such alternatives would result in avoiding and/or minimizing disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental impacts, consistent with Executive Order 12898; and
- Elicit public involvement opportunities and consider the results thereof, including soliciting input from affected minority populations and low-income populations in considering alternatives.

Nicollet County Public Works supports environmental justice through every stage of the planning, construction and maintenance processes, consistent with the factors outlined above.

This ensures Nicollet County Public Works gains input from the community that will help shape how the agency builds and maintains roads, bridges, parks, and trails.

Some ways in which Nicollet County Public Works accomplishes this include:

- Ensuring the full and fair opportunity to participate by all potentially affected communities in the transportation decision-making process;
- Avoiding, minimizing or mitigating disproportionately high and adverse human health and environmental effects, including social and economic effects, on minority populations and low-income populations;
- Providing timely information to area residents and businesses affected by transportation plans and projects;
- Performing periodic reviews of public involvement process to gauge effectiveness, making revisions as necessary; and
- Preventing the denial of, reduction in, or significant delay in the receipt of benefits by minority and low-income populations.

# XI. Public Participation

Nicollet County Public Works uses the U.S. Census data and/or State of Minnesota Demographer data and estimates to identify populations potentially affected by its projects.

The Nicollet County Public Works conducts planning and informational meetings to provide for public participation on projects and activities when appropriate. The agency adheres to Equal Employment Opportunity and civil rights assurance policies, principals and imperatives within program planning, development, and implementation. These policies are essential parts to bid documents and proposals.

Nicollet County Public Works produces fact sheets and informational flyers for specific areas of interest to the public. The agency also uses additional Public Hearings, Planning Meetings, Open Houses, Task Forces and Steering Committees to engage the public for comprehensive and strategic planning endeavors, all of which are advertised public meetings. Nicollet County also uses website and manual contact forms and records to log issues and recommendations by the public, as well as to track the responses to Resident concerns.

# XII. Limited English Proficiency (LEP) & Language Access

## Legal Background

Executive Order 13166, "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency," reprinted at 65 FR 50121, August 16, 2000, directs each Federal agency to examine the services it provides and to develop and implement a system by which LEP individuals can meaningfully access those services. Federal agencies were instructed to publish guidance to assist states and local governments who receive federal funds with their obligations to LEP individuals under Title VI. The Executive Order states that federal fund recipients, like Nicollet County Public Works, must take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to their programs and activities for LEP individuals.

Section 601 of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. 2000d, provides that no person shall "on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." Courts have interpreted Title VI's prohibition of discrimination on the basis of national origin to include discrimination based on English proficiency. Under Title VI, recipients of federal financial assistance are required to provide LEP individuals with meaningful access to their programs and services.

The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) published <u>revised guidance</u> for its recipients on December 14, 2005. This document states that Title VI and its implementing regulations require that U.S. DOT recipients take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to the benefits, services, information, and other important portions of their programs and activities for LEP individuals. Recipients use the DOT LEP Guidance to determine how best to comply with statutory and regulatory LEP obligations.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "contractor") agrees as follows:

- 1. **Compliance with Regulations:** The contractor (hereinafter includes consultants) will comply with the Acts and the Regulations relative to Non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation, **Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)**, as they may be amended from time to time, which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.
- 2. Non-discrimination: The contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, will not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. NOW, THEREFORE, the U.S. Department of Transportation as authorized by law and upon the condition that the <u>Nicollet County Public Works Department</u> will accept title to the lands and maintain the project constructed thereon in accordance with the Regulations for the Administration of **Federal Highway Administration** (FHWA), and the policies and procedures prescribed by the FHWA of the U.S. Department of Transportation in accordance with all requirements imposed by Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S Department of Transportation pertaining to and effectuating the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252; 42 U.S.C. § 2000d to 2000d-4), does hereby remise, release, quitclaim and convey unto the <u>Nicollet County Public Works Department</u> all the right, title and interest of the U.S. Department of Transportation in and to said lands described in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part hereof.

#### (HABENDUM CLAUSE)

#### TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said lands and interests therein unto

Nicollet County Public Works Departmentand its successors forever, subject, however, to the covenants,conditions, restrictions and reservations herein contained as follows, which will remain in effect for the periodduring which the real property or structures are used for a purpose for which Federal financial assistance isextended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits and will be binding on theNicollet County Public Works Department, its successors and assigns.

In the event facilities are constructed, maintained, or otherwise operated on the property described in this (deed, license, lease, permit, etc.) for a purpose for which a U.S. Department of Transportation activity, facility, or program is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits, the (grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc.) will maintain and operate such facilities and services in compliance with all requirements imposed by the Acts and Regulations (as may be amended) such that no person on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, will be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of said facilities.
- B. With respect to licenses, leases, permits, etc., in the event of breach of any of the above Non-discrimination covenants, <u>Nicollet County Public Works Department</u> will have the right to terminate the (lease, license, permit, etc.) and to enter, re-enter, and repossess said lands and facilities thereon, and hold the same as if the (lease, license, permit, etc.) had never been made or issued.\*

The (grantee, licensee, permittee, etc., as appropriate) for himself/herself, his/her heirs, personal representatives, successors in interest, and assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree (in the case of deeds and leases add, "as a covenant running with the land") that (1) no person on the ground of race, color, or national origin, will be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of said facilities, (2) that in the construction of any improvements on, over, or under such land, and the furnishing of services thereon, no person on the ground of race, color, or national origin, will be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination, (3) that the (grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc.) will use the premises in compliance with all other requirements imposed by or pursuant to the Acts and Regulations, as amended, set forth in this Assurance.
- B. With respect to (licenses, leases, permits, etc.), in the event of breach of any of the above Non-discrimination covenants, <u>Nicollet County Public Works Department</u> will have the right to terminate the (license, permit, etc., as appropriate) and to enter or re-enter and repossess said land and the facilities thereon, and hold the same as if said (license, permit, etc., as appropriate) had never been made or issued.\*




Title VI and its regulations require Nicollet County Public Works to take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to its information and services. What constitutes reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access is flexible, fact-dependent, and contingent on a four-factor analysis established by the U.S. Department of Justice. The four-factor analysis is an individualized assessment that should be applied to determine what reasonable steps must be taken to ensure meaningful access for LEP individuals. **The analysis below is updated at least once every five years.** 

## FACTOR #1: THE NUMBER OR PROPORTION OF LEP INDIVIDUALS ELIGIBLE TO BE SERVED OR LIKELY TO BE ENCOUNTERED

Generally, Nicollet County Public Works will use reliable external data sources to determine the number or proportion of LEP individuals likely to be served or encountered.

Nicollet County Public Works relies on <u>MnDOT's LEP Data Tool</u> to provide the necessary data. In the most recent analysis, conducted in November 2022, the findings on the next two pages were documented.

## Safe Harbor Provision (Written Documents)

U.S. DOT LEP Guidance provides a "safe harbor" to help ensure greater clarity regarding whether Nicollet County is meeting its obligation to provide written translations. These safe harbor provisions only apply to the translation of written documents and do not affect the requirement to provide meaningful access to LEP individuals through competent oral interpreters where oral language assistance services are needed and reasonable.

The following actions are considered strong evidence of compliance with the Department's written-translation obligations:

(a) Providing written translations of vital documents for **each eligible LEP language group that constitutes 5% or 1,000 people** of the population of individuals eligible to be served or likely to be affected or encountered. Translation of non-vital documents, if needed, can be provided orally; or

(b) If there are fewer than 50 individuals in a language group that reaches the 5% trigger in (a), the vital written materials are not translated, but written notice of the right to receive free, competent oral interpretation of those vital written materials in the primary language of the LEP language group of is provided.

The above findings from the graphs on the preceding pages did not indicate any LEP language groups meet the safe harbor threshold. Therefore, Nicollet County Public Works will not proactively translate written documents at this time. However, efforts will be made to reasonably accommodate any language access requests that arise.

## FACTOR #2: THE FREQUENCY WITH WHICH LEP INDIVIDUALS COME IN CONTACT WITH THE PROGRAM, ACTIVITY, OR SERVICE

LEP persons may interact in several ways with Nicollet County, including but not limited to:

- Public meetings
- Community events
- Project-specific meetings, events, and discussions
- Online engagement
- Walk-in requests for information
- Phone communications
- Customer service interactions
- Surveys for information
- Requests for permits, licenses, or materials
- Real estate transactions (i.e., right of way)

Nicollet County Public Works will assess, as accurately as possible over the next 5-year period, the frequency with which LEP persons from different language groups come into contact with its programs and activities.

# FACTOR #3: THE NATURE AND IMPORTANCE OF THE PROGRAM, ACTIVITY, OR SERVICE TO PEOPLE'S LIVES

As provided in USDOT's LEP policy guidance, the more important the activity, information, service, or program, or the greater the possible consequences of the contact to LEP persons, the more likely language services are needed. RCPWD is committed to assessing the services provided by each program area to determine the implications for an LEP person or community in order to ensure meaningful access.

## Vital Documents

Because no languages were identified as meeting the safe harbor threshold for translating vital written materials, Nicollet County Public Works is not at this time providing a list of documents considered vital. Should future analysis indicate an LEP group meeting the safe harbor threshold, the agency will evaluate its vital documents and provide translations in accordance with the analysis and federal guidance.

## FACTOR #4: THE RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO NICOLLET COUNTY PUBLIC WORKS AND THE COST OF LANGUAGE ASSISTANCE

Currently, Nicollet County has the following language services available:

• Language Line: Provides telephone-based, on-demand access to language interpreters 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, year-round. The service assists staff in communicating effectively with LEP individuals.

Bids were opened on July 18, 2023 at 11AM for the 2023 Highway Stripi	ng Project. 1 bid was reco	eived and opened. Results are as follows:			
Sir Lines-A-Lot \$259,138.15					
The 2023 Highway Striping Project re-stripes a portion of the paved cour	nty roads.				
Since the bid amount was higher than the Engineer's Estimate I reached out to several County Engineers to see what they had received for bidders and results. All have had one bidder and the bids have been 25-40% higher than last year's bids. Reasons for higher bids this year are the result of a combination of factors: Sir Lines-A-Lot over the last two years has bought out the other two major striping contractors which just leaves one primary striping contractor in the state, material costs have increased (especially epoxy), and the Contractor is recouping loses suffered during the pandemic years when the Contractor had contracts in place with prices locked and then materials costs significantly increased after those contract prices were established.
